The saga of the Old School continues with everyone awaiting the outcome of the Diocesan application to remove the clause which restricts the use of the building to educational purposes. Whilst there appears to be no immediate threat to the users of the Old School we need to give the Old School Trust our support to seek an amicable outcome for all parties. We need to keep our community facilities and the services they support.

Now September is here we have three months before Christmas becomes our main focus. This is always a busy time of year as we return from our holidays full of new ideas and a determination to start something new or finish off that project that has been sitting around for months. It is a time to get things done!

Chairman's update

Hello and welcome to the September/ October newsletter.

I hope that everyone enjoyed the summer, although July was such a disappointment with very wet weather and dark cloudy skies but the gardens seem to have done well and everything appears lush and green. The planters around the village look amazing with an abundance of colourful annuals for us all to enjoy. The village centre is also very colourful with beautiful hanging baskets adorning the walls of local businesses plus the Station gardens are once again looking their best. I would like to thank everyone who contributes to helping to make our village the special place it is.

Finally, the Department for Levelling up, Housing and Communities have confirmed that the funding will be available to continue our Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP). We were expecting this to be available in May which is a three-month delay. Hopefully we will be close to completing it by the end of March otherwise we will have to apply for funding again in the next tax year.

The TRPF building schedule is complete and has been put out to tender on the Government Contracts Finder website as per the process. Local building companies also have the opportunity to bid for the work. The closing date for completing the tender is the 31^{st of} August 2023. The tenders will then be evaluated and a decision on whom we award the work will be made at our September Council meeting.

Litter continues to be a problem around the village, in particular on the main thoroughfares through the village, Etwall Road, Twyford Road, Carriers Way/Castle Way and Repton Road. Whilst a number of individuals do a tremendous job in carrying out litter picks, the Parish Council are considering arranging a regular monthly litter pick by volunteers. Please can we have our bus back? whilst there may be good reason to seek the reinstatement of the bus links to the eastern end of the village and sympathy for those who need/used the bus village service, there are many who would not want to see its return without major alterations.

There was an issue with the bus service for a long time. The growth in car ownership and the increase in bus sizes were ill matched to the residential roads that they used. Car parking along Trent Avenue became an issue with damage to vehicles and parked cars causing delays to bus services. Damage to cars was reported along Hall Lane, Oaks Road and Beech Ave, all of which added to the conflict and dissatisfaction of the residents and bus drivers alike.

However, this is not only about buses. Whilst there is a 7.5 ton limit on vehicles using the village it appears to be abused on a daily basis. For example Beech Ave sees up to 34 heavy vehicles, including school coaches, articulated lorries, cement mixers and co-op delivery lorries on a daily basis, most of which use the road as a rat run and to avoid the bridges in the village centre; most of which are some 8'4" wide which takes up over half of the road, leaving little room for parked cars (unless they park on the verges/kerbs) or passing traffic. This makes life more difficult for pedestrians, but easier for lorry drivers which only adds to the general safety issue.

Whilst the basic request for the return of the bus service is a call to improve village life and reinstate the village service it emphasizes the need to consider other issues on traffic movement within and around the village. Consideration needs to be given to how we can reconfigure a bus service to service the village without revisiting the old issues; how to enforce the vehicle weight limits and reclaim our village roads; rethink speed limits on residential streets and generally address movement around the village.

This is not a problem that will go away. As the village grows (as it will) there will be a general increase in traffic as well as an increased call for public transport (linked to sustainability). A general plea for the return of the bus service is clearly not enough.

WILLINGTON SURGERY PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP

The revised appointment system

The surgery currently has 10,038 patients registered from Willington, Repton, Milton, Newton Solney, Etwall, Hilton. Ticknall, Eggington, Findern and Barrow on Trent. This number of patients makes the phone very busy: in June 21,899 calls were answered of which 2,324 were before 9am.

The surgery, alongside the NHS contract, has made some changes in Phase One to the way appointments are offered:

- 1. Call at 8am only if you need an appointment for an urgent issue on the same day.
- 2. Call after 10am any day for all other appointments, which are now available for up to a maximum of two weeks in advance.

The surgery receptionists have been trained by the GPs to identify the needs of patients from the information they are given, so that they can signpost you to the most appropriate service. If that is a doctor's appointment, you will be given an appointment, either to attend the surgery, if a physical examination is needed, or a telephone conversation. You could be signposted to an "in surgery" first contact physiotherapy or clinical pharmacist, a social prescriber or Health & Wellbeing coach and very shortly a mental health nurse for over 18 years old patients. You might also be signposted to 111, a community pharmacist (either to go directly or for them to contact you) or a walk-in clinic as there is always only a certain amount of appointment available.

Hopefully the availability of non urgent appointments any day, in advance, will reduce the long waits at 8am. If it is another speciality, where the surgery or the NHS does not offer the relevant service e.g., chiropody/podiatry, you will be asked to self-refer.

Phase Two of the revised system, will include some longer appointments to accommodate patients with multiple problems, thus avoiding the need for a second appointment.
