# Chairman's update .....

Hello and welcome to the November / December newsletter.

The weather has been its usual unpredictable self, having cold and wet days interspersed with some warm sunny days. What we do know is that winter is just about on us, the clocks have been put back and the nights are now drawing in.

It is a busy time for the Parish council at the moment and I would like to give an update on all we are currently involved in.

Remembrance Sunday is on  $12^{\text{th}}$  November. The Parish Council will be laying a wreath at the church on behalf of the village plus we have purchased additional poppies to decorate the lampposts around the centre of the village.

We have finally received the funding to continue with the Neighbourhood Development Plan. Our target is to complete the plan within the next nine months.

As I mentioned in the last Newsletter, we have purchased a large number of dog poo bags to fill our dispensers, one is located on Kingfisher Lane near the surgery and the second one is being re sited from the Station Garden to Trent Avenue playing field near the school. Unfortunately, the bags that fit these dispensers are expensive to purchase and for parishioners use who may have forgotten to take any bags out or for use in an emergency. Pease only take what you require for that occasion. Thank you.

Now that we have recruited new Councillors, we have decided to resurrect the Recreational and Amenities Committee (RAC) and the Footpaths and open Space Group (FOSG). These committees will focus on the footpaths, walkways and general maintenance around the village. The meetings are open to the public, details of future meetings will be posted on the noticeboards and our website.

The Parish Council have recently made the following donation of £350 to the local Scouts group towards the cost of their firework display which will take place as usual on Twyford Road Playing Field. This event has always been very popular and I would recommend that anyone who hasn't attended before to go and have a look.

We have also donated £240 to the bowls club towards servicing their mower. Obviously, bowls is a spring/summer pastime, the club is a friendly club and would welcome more members. If anyone is interested the contact details are on our website.

As many of you have noticed, the bridge over the river Trent has unfortunately been damaged and a temporary repair has been put in place to make the bridge safe. The plan for Derbyshire County Council is for them to retrieve the original bridge stone out the river and rebuild the bridge, with the original stone. Any stone that cannot be reused will be replaced by stone of a similar colour and age. We are currently awaiting a date for completion.

With regards to the Christmas celebrations, we will be switching the Christmas lights on at the Station Garden on Friday  $1^{\rm st}$  December. We are purchasing more clear baubles again for people to fill and hang onto the tree to remind them of their lost loved ones. Everyone is welcome to come and join us to sing Christmas carols and of course mince pies will be available for all. Details of where to pick up a bauble and the event will be published on our website, noticeboards and of course social media nearer the time.

We have received the quotes for the Community Hall and new changing rooms for the TRPF and we are currently reviewing the quotes and will be discussing with potential suppliers to get the best possible value for money and a quality building. We are also exploring avenues for grants that are available to help contribute to the cost.

Our next Parish Council meeting is on Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> November at the Old School, Castleway at 7pm. All are welcome to attend.

# **COMMUNITY VOICE**

# **Promises. Promises.**

.... the chance to have your say!

As River Trent floodplainers in South Derbyshire our hearts go out to all those people so badly affected by recent fluvial flooding elsewhere. But perhaps we are all over-reacting? After all we are often told by politicians of all complexions that "Lessons will be learned," and from the Government itself, that it will "spend whatever it costs" to sort flood damage bills incurred by individuals and small businesses.

I was a participant in the Government's Floodforum, and received a call to attend a meeting to be held in the Science Museum, in London. Topics included:-

London's drowning? Thinking of buying a house in London? Maybe it should be a houseboat.

The climate is changing and flooding is likely to hit Britain in a big way. Will floods become a regular feature of life? How are we going to be affected?

What preparations are being made?

The notice of meeting came from the Edemocracy Programme, Hansard Society. And the date of the meeting? Oh yes – **24 March 2002**.

By chance, that was the year that SDDC published its then-proposed Local Plan which would have seen 1000+ houses and a totally unsuited industrial estate built on the Willington power station site. The Inquiry inspector who had been appointed to decide the Local Plan's outcome received objections from many quarters, and was astounded to receive 400 letters of objection from individuals (were you perhaps one of them?). Quite properly the power station application was rejected, and with it the proposed Local Plan failed. Another attempt in 2007 - this time a Conjoined SDDC/Derby City Council proposal for housing estates on various sites to the south side of Derby - would again have seen 1000 houses on the power station site. .The Conjoined proposal was largely accepted but the appointed Inspector rejected the proposed development of the Willington power station site proposal once again. Flood risk was a major reason for his rejection.

Today, 2023, the government continues to tell us, "Lessons will be learned." But when will those lessons be implemented, I wonder? At Willington, since the year 2000 floods, we have seen no flood alleviation measures taken other than a riverbank non-return valve to perhaps protect five properties. But when will the "learned lessons" be implemented here?

After all, since 2002 several Willington developments on or closely adjacent to the Trent floodplain have been given Planning Approval. This, despite objections from well-knowledged residents on known local flood risk grounds.

So, have "lessons been learned"? Or, yet again, just more "Promises, promises?"

# WILLINGTON SURGERY PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP

### What happens in Repton Health Centre?

The PPG has been asked by some Surgery users to find out a bit more about the health centre in Repton and if/how it is still linked to Willington Surgery.

Repton Health Centre, situated (entrance) off Askew Grove, is part of the Derbyshire Community Health Services NHS Foundation Trust. It is managed by Swadlincote Health Centre staff and is not linked to Willington Surgery. It no longer provides GP services, but houses a number of patient support services (although none are there all the time) which include continence services (adult and children), Health Visitors, Speech & Language Therapy (adult and children), some Physiotherapy, a wound clinic and podiatry.

For most of those services you will need to be referred via your GP although you can self-refer to podiatry by completing the online form (put Repton Health Centre into your search engine and there is a link for the form) to assess whether you meet the criteria to be an NHS patient.

**Hearing Aid Batteries:** Hospitals are no longer supplying hearing aid batteries; patients should go to wherever they got their aid from, and they will supply the batteries.

"Friargate Bridge. The past present & future of Handyside's Masterpiece"



Friargate Railway Bridge built in 1878 by Andrew Handyside and Company, an iron founder in Derby, for the Derby Friargate Line of the Great Northern Railway, to span the elegant Georgian street of Friargate. The line was part of the Derbyshire and Staffordshire extension of the Great Northern Railway. It linked Nottlingham and Grantham to Burton upon Trent.
